Lyle Bercier Interview Extracts

October 30, 2014 Lexington Park, MD

Background: Lyle was in charge of procurement and support of the first C-130 aircraft for TACAMO while he was a manager in the US Navy Bureau of Aeronautics (BuAer pronounced BU AIR) in the early 1960s. He obtained and obligated the funds to buy the first two sets of Hercs, the 151 and 156 BUNO series. Lyle retired from government service as a GS-15 Aeronautical Engineer in 1974 and continued as a consultant to the Navy until 1987. During World War II, Gunner's Mate 3rd Class Lyle Bercier was a crewman aboard the USS Quail (AM-15) a 187 ft, 840 ton mine sweeper stationed at Manila, Bay Philippines. Quail's role was to keep the sea lanes open through the mine field protecting the southern approaches to Manila off the island of Corregidor. Between 8 December 1941 and early May 1942 Quail did that and much more. When the Philippines were surrendered and Quail had no fuel or ammo left, she was scuttled and her captain and 17 other surviving crew members escaped in a 36 ft motor boat. They sailed south from Corregidor and arrived in Australia in early June. They had traveled 29 days and 2,060 miles with no sextant, no decent navigation charts, and using a pocket watch as their chronometer. Claim to fame-"I was in BUAIR when I got the program in 1963. I was the designated TACAMO program manager from 1959 to 1965, even after I was moved from BUAIR to NAVMAT (Navy Material Command) in 1964. VADM Ike Kidd ordered me to keep TACAMO even though I had another full time job working for him in NAVMAT. We had a fight trying to get those first four aircraft off the Air Force production line. An Air Force general in the Pentagon told me he would whoop my ass if I didn't get off his airplanes."

Who paid the bill?- "When we bought these airplanes nobody in the Navy in the Pentagon gave a damn about them. You couldn't talk to anybody in OP 05 (Aircraft Programs) and the guy in OP 09 (Submarine Programs) didn't seem to care either. So the money came direct to me from OSD! There was a guy in OSD who was only one I could talk to and get any backing from. The program came to me at BUAIR directly from NADC without any Navy program sponsor."



Who picked up the first four?- "Ron Carlson picked up 890 and 891 for the Pacific and George Watts picked up 888 and 889 for the Atlantic in late 1963 and early 1964. Ron had to taxi out of Marietta in the snow and head for Barbers Point via Dayton and Alameda and George taxied out behind him, heading for Pax River."

<u>Famous Admiral's direction</u>- "When we bought that second group, 170 to 177, again the money and the support came direct from OSD. But VADM John Thach, OP 05, cornered me one day in the Pentagon and told me "You put out the word that those airplanes are NOT to used for hauling cargo or people. Tell those VR guys to knock it off. They can only be used for training and TACAMO." AIRLANT and AIRPAC pretty much did what they wanted to with the first four and Ron even flew 891 clear around the world in 1964, hauling cargo. As soon as they put the TACAMO gear in permanently why that ended that."

Other Famous TACAMO Pioneers-"I knew Jay McCormick when he as at NAVELEX as the VLF expert and later he went to NAVAIR as the Deputy Program manager for TACAMO. Ed Preston came from VQ-3 as the first CO to NAVELEX as Jay's boss and then later NAVAIR with the program down in Dallas. I met Art Collins (founder of Collins Radio) and some of his staff but I was more just buying the airplanes. Two of Art's guys I met were Bob Carroll and Tom Martin who went on to form E Systems when they left Collins."

Fondest Memory of TACAMO- "Well that first year in Dallas everybody worked like hell and everybody had a good time. I'd like to know how much wire we dropped in the Gulf of Mexico in those early testing flights. Everybody was very happy that they were getting something important done. Collins Radio was very interested in us getting it right and sent their chief engineer down several times to work stuff out. This was on those first four 890 series birds. The thing about it was the Navy crews were usually all the same people and they worked hard and helped build those first systems and make them work."

Chance Meeting-"One time I was down there at Addison Field before we moved over to Love Field and early one morning a guy came up to me asked what kind of airplanes these were and I told him C-130s. He said they all belong to the NAVY? and I said Yeah. Then he says I'd like to see the inside of one of them. So I asked Well who are you? and he says Oh I am a football coach here in Dallas, Tom Landry. So I took him up to the cockpit and showed him around and he was very pleased and grateful." (Landry was a B-17 Flying Fortress bomber aircraft commander in Europe in WWII)

<u>Final Words</u>- Asked what he would say to those attending the Marietta reunion and those working the TACAMO program today, Lyle replied "Well I can't make down there" and "Don't screw it (the program) up."

PARALOFT UNVEILS NEW STORE ITEMS AT MARIETTA REUNION

The 2014 Marietta reunion saw the <u>Paraloft</u> unveil several new items that generated a considerable amount of attention to many of the reunion attendees and TACAMO memorabilia collectors. Just because you were not in attendance does not mean you missed out! These new items are available by clicking on <u>Paraloft</u>.





The first of such items was the Lockheed/Martin "Yoke Emblem". Each new and reworked EC-130G/Q aircraft that was flown to a TACAMO squadron by squadron flight deck crews from Lockheed Georgia or a rework deport was fitted with this emblem which was located in the center of the Pilot and co-pilot yokes. All the yoke emblems from the 22 TACAMO Hercs have not been accounted for but they are truly a collector's treasure. By special permission of Lockheed/Martin Marietta, TCVA was granted permission to replicate a number of the yoke emblems for those serious collectors. The emblem is proudly mounted on a 5 x 7" plaque with a brass plaque below briefly explaining the significance of this treasure.

Also unveiled was the EC-130 and E-6 tail flashes. Measuring 6" these beauties sit on a wood like base. Squadron patches are included in the tails making these a unique piece of memorabilia or gift for that special shipmate. The Herc tails sport the Department of the Navy seal while the Merc tails have the United States Strategic Command seal. We can personalize base with a brass name tag that includes 2-3 lines of text. Inscribe the dates of service in a squadron or both squadrons or your rank/rate or your aircrew position. These look great on a bookcase or a desk without taking up too much room.



Many have asked for more clothing attire so we brought the Charles River black hooded



pullover windbreaker/rain jacket embroidered with TACAMO on the left breast in gold stitching. This light weight wind/rain jacket so extremely light, warm and waterproof. The softex fabric has a powder soft and lightweight hand feel, has underarm grommets for added ventilation, extended zipper at the neck for added wind protection and easy on and off and packs into its own pouch pocket with zipper closure for easy packing and storage.



We have found that the trend for attendees at the reunions is to place important or memorable pins on their TACAMO hats. Pins like the Herc, or AC/NFO/Pilot wings, the TACAMOPAC Crew-4 memorable pin, the various reunion pins or the TACAMO Chiefs pin even the 1,000, 2,000 or even 5,000 hour pins. We all remember that at one time we all wore pins on our hats, jackets or name tags when we flew but the times have changed and due to stricter FOD precautions regulations prohibit the practice. But that doesn't mean you cannot show them off at the reunion. To help you start your collection we have introduced the squadron pins which include VQ-3, old VQ-4, new VQ-4 and VQ-7. These are now available in the Paraloft.



Last but not least of the new items introduced at this year's reunion is the return of the popular EC-130 ball caps. Front view of the mighty Herc above its nomenclature "EC-130" embroidered on a structured crown and "TACAMO" embroidered above the rear eyelet of the Velcro adjustable strap. These favorites are available in Black/White and Khaki/Navy/White.

We are currently working on a smaller more expansive museum presence in Patuxent River, the Naval Aviation Museum in Pensacola, Naval Academy and Oklahoma City (location TBD) in the immediate future. The goal is to present the mission, people, aircraft, and history.

A proposed footprint of the exhibit is being developed and discussed at this time. Picture a glass exhibit case 4'x4'x8' tall, and use the models that we get from the Philippines, Herc and Merc(B) flying with drogues on wires behind and a model SSBN in faux water below. Include graphics as to the mission and a brief history. Then we add a couple of panels discussing the people, mission and history with interactive video series showing the History channel special, the Boeing 707 barrel roll by Tex Johnston, History of the Reel Operations, and other significant historical milestones. (See NAOC panel example) In addition, we would display the many artifacts the YOU have donated in another display case that could be rotated from museum to museum.

Although this is not a stand alone Heritage Center, it would be a consistent exhibit that gets our mission in places of exposure in many places.


