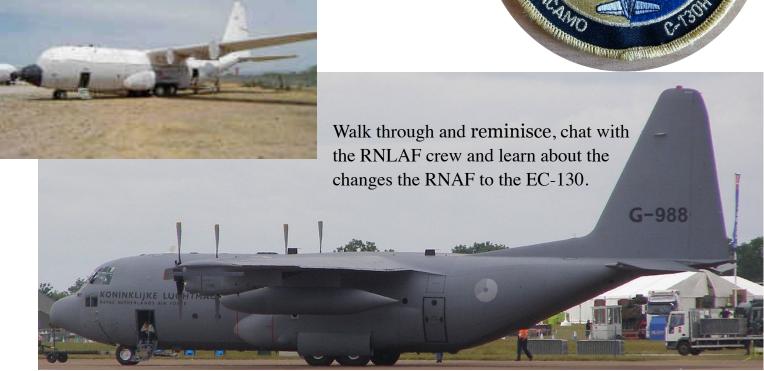

LETTER FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, Mike Vos

50 years ago, the Navy began its relationship with the C-130. The "Herc" had been around for 10 years by then. The Air Force had widely used them as cargo and transport vehicles, however this was different. The Navy needed a durable, robust airframe to do something really crazy, broadcast VLF radio to submerged submarines.

There had been trailing wire antennas before but for HF frequencies. VLF had wavelengths that required miles not feet of trailing wire antenna and eventually an even longer wire just to help its propagation. The engines also needed to be robust enough to drive generators to power a 25K watt and eventually a 200K watt transmitter. The aircraft had to have a range great enough to traverse an ocean and still take time to 'hang on its props' for an hour or two to perform its strategic mission.

In the early 60's when we were struggling to put a man into space, the afore mentioned mission must have seemed CRAZY.

But, engineers from Lockheed, Rockwell/Collins and the Navy knocked their heads together and equipped the Lockheed C-130 Hercules to perform this crazy mission the point where 24/7/365 coverage was maintained for years by a only a handful of "Hercs".

The strategic defense of the U.S. was in large part supported by TACAMO through the "Cold War" enabling the President to have nearly immediate communication with his nuclear assets submerged at sea. This acted as a deterrent that actually made MAD (Mutually Assured Destruction) work.

Yes, the C-130 was the vehicle, but it was also the Navy personnel and Lockheed and Rockwell/Collins Tech Reps that made it all work. We TACAMO Sailors should be proud of the silent work we did to be part of this instrument of peace.

Let's also be grateful to that old "Herc" for being that vehicle that flew from party to party. ;-)

Where are the TACAMO Hercs

For 30 years, from December of 1963 to August of 1993 these US Navy model EC-130G and EC-130Q kept silent watch over America. For almost 20 years they flew non-stop 24 hours a day, 7 days a week "Just in Case". Most are but a memory on paper in the Naval Historical Archives and in the minds and hearts of the Crews that flew them and the Maintainers that kept them in the air.

Navy fleet chief: Enlisted ranks not facing major cuts

U.S. Fleet Forces Fleet Master Chief Charles "Chuck" Clarke, U.S. Fleet Forces Command, talks with Sailors during a TACAMO (Take Charge And Move Out) all-hands call in June. He discussed the current status of the Navy and fielded questions about Sailors' concerns. TACAMO is responsible to Commander Naval Air Forces for manning, training and equipping the Navy squadrons responsible for nuclear command and control communications to the nation's nuclear triad mission.

The U.S. Fleet Forces' highest-ranking master chief recently delivered some good job security news to Strategic Communications Wing One personnel at Tinker Air Force Base.

Fleet Master Chief Petty Officer Charles "Chuck" Clarke spoke to more than 500 TACAMO (Take Charge and Move Out) members at an all hands call in a Fleet Air Reconnaissance Squadron FOUR hangar.

While other military branches are facing significant cuts to personnel due to ongoing budget cuts, the Navy's enlisted ranks are at a good level for the near future, Master Chief Clarke said.

"We're right-sized, believe it or not," he said. "Even with the LCS (littoral combat ships) coming online and everything else, we don't plan on growing or shrinking any farther than we already are."

The Navy currently has about 323,000 active duty members, of which about 266,000 are enlisted. The force includes 288 ships and submarines and over 3,700 aircraft. Littoral combat ships are among the newest Navy ships and designed to fight engagements in shallower waters near land.

Master Chief Clarke told the Tinker Take Off that he's

impressed with the cohesion of the TACAMO wing.

Items hauled in TACAMO II and III Submitted by Wally Goss

In late 1964 the VR-21 TACAMO Component was moving from Barber's Point Hawaii to VW-1 TACAMO on Guam, we were doing two or three day turn around and hauling just about anything a person could own. Entire household goods made the trip. I can



remember a time when my ditching station we inside a VW bug. We hauled a piano, an organ, several small boats and various animals. The biggest animal was a full grown HORSE. We were really worried about the horse coming out of the light sedation and a big mess to clean up. Luckily we didn't have any road apples to deal with.

When we started the transfer to Guam we would come in at night. Back then, you picked up your car at the Naval Station and had to get a safety inspection in Agana before coming on base to get a base sticker. Well, it wasn't long before NAS Agana Security was questioning how we got a car on base without a Guam safety inspection. We changed our schedule to accommodate the time difference, but those two day turn around, before we took another load, were rough.

While on Guam we had a ship come in once a month or so with most of the household goods and commissary items. There would be all a person's furniture, their car and any other item that was not able to be flown in. Well one day in early 1967, the "SS Guam Bear" cargo ship was hit by the ESSO Seattle, an oil company ship. They towed the "SS Guam Bear" up onto a reef and waited for the government agencies to hash it out. You could see household items and cars but under litigation no one could remove any items. Finally after several months, the SS Guam Bear was towed out to the Mariana trench and blown up by the Navy. They even broadcasted it on Guam TV. The saddest part was that no one got any of their items off the ship that I am aware of. And, of course, as time passed by everyone who had ever been on Guam had something on that ship.

Memorable time in the Navy while on my way to VQ-3 Submitted by Tommy Schafer

My memories of the military go back long before I ever joined the U.S. Navy. I recall hearing stories told by my dad and uncle about family members serving in WWII, Vietnam and their various branches of service. My dad and uncle were both serving in the 139th Airlift Squadron, part of the USAF Tactical Airlift Command. My father infrequently deployed for a couple weeks to a few days of course he always had guard weekend. Often (multiple times a week) he would fly proficiency flights in the evening after work to keep current on his hours.

After 17 years with the 139th, my father took an active duty slot with the 129th ARRS out of N.A.S. Moffett in Sunnyvale, CA. Shortly after this, I went to see about also joining the USAF... after all that is what I knew best. The Air Force recruiter was out of his office and those Navy Recruiters were looking to pounce upon anything that walked up to his door.

The Navy Recruiter started off by saying: "So, you want to work on airplanes." I said well yes but what I really want to do is fly them, like my dad. So he responds with: "You know the Navy has more aircraft than the Air Force". This intrigued me... that branch that advertises guys working on ships and port calls all over the world have AIRPLANES? So I asked, can I be a Flight Engineer on C-130's? They Recruiter said well no, Flight Engineers have to have experience working on aircraft and be recommended to receive this training to do that job but... there are several jobs that you can sign up for that will get you in a position to become a Flight Engineer. They had me... tailhook, arresting cable and anchor.

I took the ASFAB, then went to MEPS. I guess I did OK as I was offered several jobs... AT, AE, AD, AM, YM... and I chose AM(S) - Aircraft Mechanic - Structures, with a 4 years hitch and a guaranteed A-School and joined the Navy. While in AMS A-School, I selected my dream duty-station (HAWAII) and I volunteered for "AIRCREW"... and I was selected for both. After completing A-School I was on to N.A.S. Pensacola for Naval Aircrewman Candidate School, then N.A.S./N.A.T.C. Patuxent River for Mission

Equipment School, then Redstone Arsenal for Aircraft Systems School, and finally on to my duty squadron: Fleet Air Reconnaissance Squadron Three (VQ-3) at N.A.S. Barber's Point to be a Reel Operator on the EC-130Q and then transition to the E-6A.

On my way cross country in my P.O.V., I visited my dad. I had previously arranged for him to help me get my car to the MATSON terminal near San Francisco to be shipped to Hawaii. After arriving at his home, he explained that he had an urgent flight the next morning to transport men and materials to a small civilian airport in Washington State. It seems that one of their squadron's HH-3's was aloft when its rotor blades began to separate. So they were forced to land at the closest airport and that turned out to be a small light aircraft airport.

He asked if I would like to go along and of course I said, HELL YEAH!. My dad called the squadron and arranged for me to join them on this flight. I had my flight gear, paperwork and qual jacket with me in transit so, everything was in order. The next morning dad and I went to his squadron, did aircraft pref-light checks, mission brief and he lined me out with what was going to take place to keep me out of the way and allow me to be helpful where I could be. He set me up in the jump seat on the flight deck ("cockpit" in zoomy lingo) in one of their HC-130H's. I was able to sit there for the flight up and back... one of the best views in all my days of flying from the back of the bus. Flying into and out of this airport was awesome. To see how short a runway a C-130 needs to land and take off is very impressive. To be in the bird when it lands and takes off from these short runways is better than any amusement park thrill ride. The only thing that ever compared to this was landing in a EC-130Q



at El Toro MCAS, hard bank on final... I was looking across the bird out the side windows and seeing nothing but ground.

This is a memory that I will never forget and meant the most to me of all my time in the military. The military brat and his dad flying together and it was my first military flight, ever.

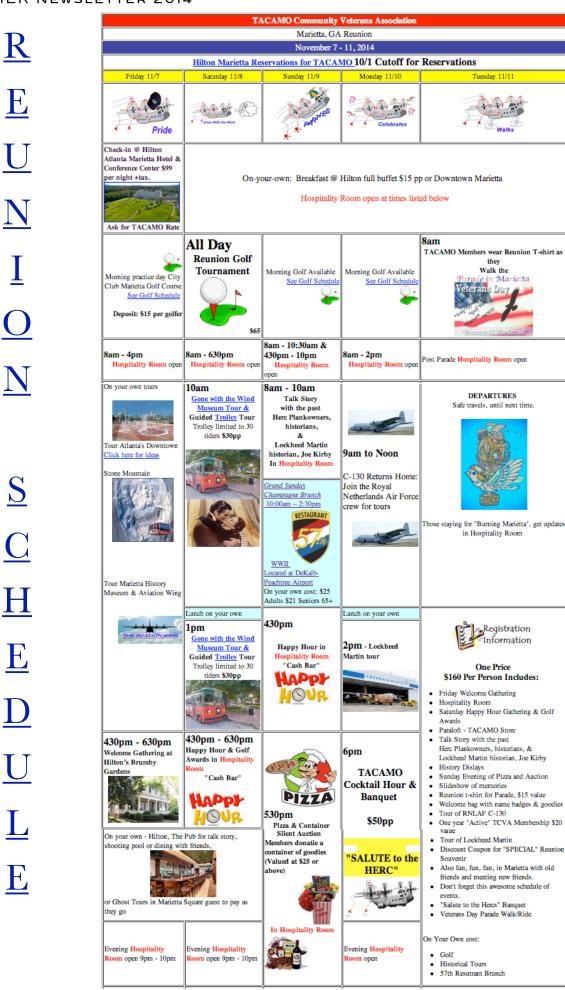

What influenced your decision to join the

military? I worked my way across country starting in PA ending up in CA and thought, what the hell let's see the world.

What was your service career path? Went to Memphis for A school and AFTA, then to Guam with VQ-1 as an I level technician. From there, VQ-4 Pax River as a ground pounder. Went aircrew in VQ-4, taught C-130 IFT course at NAMTRADET Pax. Built and taught the E-6 data differences course to both squadron's IFTs. Back to VQ-4 as the E-6 IFT evaluator and a C-130 IFT. Went to NAVAIR HQ Crystal City, in the TACAMO program office as an ATCS. During this time, obtained my Bachelor's Degree from SUNY. Transferred to the TACAIR EW program office, until I went to the Eisenhower for a year. Retired from the IKE and worked as a contractor for a year. I am now a civil servant and the Deputy Department head for technical data at NAVAIR HQ.

Of the medals, awards and qualification badges or devices you received, what is the most meaningful to you and why? My Aircrew Quals, I worked hard for that qualification (followed very closely by my Air Warfare designation). I have over 5000 hours on the Herc and 800 plus hours on the E-6.

Did you participate in combat operations? if so, could you describe those which were significant to you? As an AT2, I was on the IKE during the Iran Iraq war. The Iranians launched airplanes at us every day.

Which, of the TACAMO Squadrons you were assigned to, do you have the fondest memories of and why? VQ-4! I arrived an E-5 and left an ATCS so too many fond memories to list here.

From your entire service career what particular memory stands out?

Sadly, my most vivid memory involves a non-combat related shooting. While stationed in Crystal City, a disgruntled civilian started shooting in the building. When I went in the office to check on a wounded CDR, the shooter came around the corner with the gun in his hand...my retreat was not slow! Fortunately, the CDR survived. Unfortunately, the shooter took his own life.

Which individual person from your TACAMO service stands out as the one who had the biggest impact on you and why? LCDR Nora Tyson, now Admiral. I flew with her and she was my OINC at NAMTRADET. She was a tremendous leader and mentor and was instrumental in helping me make Chief.

How has military service influenced the way you have approached your life and career? The military taught me the importance of responsibility and accountability. My active duty service enables me to better serve the fleet as a civil servant at NAVAIR.

In what ways has TCVA helped you maintain a bond with your service and those you served with? The association and the newsletter allow me to keep up to speed with the current fleet and the "old salts" as well. I see a lot of familiar names and read some great "sea" stories.

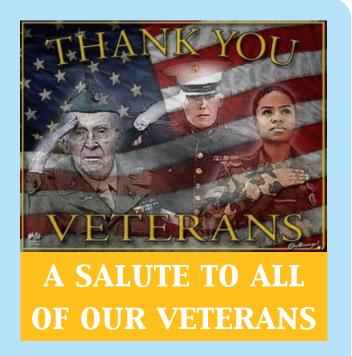
